The Power of Death

“Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour. And about the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice saying, ‘My God, my God, why have You forsaken Me?’... And Jesus cried out again with a loud voice and yielded up His Spirit.” Matthew 27:45-46, 50



As I write this article, it seems as though the Christmas season was just a few weeks ago. Now this month we'll anticipate Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent.

We'll move from the birth of Jesus to His death in a few short months as we move through the first half of the Church calendar year.

It's an irony, yet it's true: there is great power in death. Though a body lies lifeless in an open casket, there is power in death. When a loved one dies, schedules and agendas and expenses are manipulated and managed with nary a thought, and, all on your calendars that was deemed important, pales in significance when confronted with the loss of someone whose life had been intertwined with yours for many years. There is great power in death. Tears of sorrow and grief are unleashed unabashedly, and it doesn't matter who hears your sobbing. Death is relentless. Its finality defies comprehension. It can't be predicted or compartmentalized to just one segment of our society. Its breadth and scope reaches into every family, every nation and culture in the world, every age, every person, one by one or in vast multitudes.

As I write this article it is Thursday, January 14th. An earthquake just struck Haiti two days ago. The world seemed to stop and hold its breath for a few hours, and then the power of death began to mobilize nations around the world to respond and provide relief. Tens of thousands have died and will be buried. A nation will grieve for years to come as it struggles to rebuild.

Some 2,000 years ago another death occurred which was far more powerful. The earth turned dark and seemed to stop on her axis. God's Son hung dead on a cross. The same grief and despair and fear gripped His followers for some three days. The earth quaked. Rocks were split. The curtain of the temple was ripped from top to bottom. Tombs opened, and the faithful in those tombs came alive. Jesus did not die quietly. His breath didn't just slip away as in the darkness of night. He cried out loudly, and died.

Have you ever pondered Christ's death on His cross and the power His death has upon you and the entire world? His is the power to forgive and save. His is the power to rise from that death. His is the power to give and share life over death with those who believe.

As we begin our Lenten journey this year, I invite you to join fellow brothers and sisters in Christ and learn again of His power over death.

May God go with you in your Lenten pilgrimage.

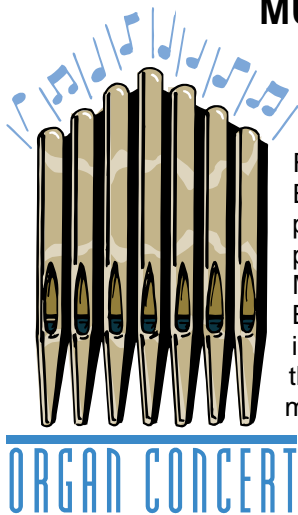

Homebound Visitation Ministry

Ten years ago, I began venturing into working with seniors and nursing homes. My mother and her friend started me with visiting the sick and dying. I learned there are not enough flowers or puppies to bring on a visit. If children come with you, they are "universal grandchildren" visiting that are talked to and watched and cuddled by the residents.



I gave a birthday party for my 86 yr old resident I visited every Saturday for 3 years. Her roommate shared in the party and ate not one, but two large pieces of birthday cake. All had a great time. Two weeks later the roommate, who had been dumped in the home 17 years before, died. No children ever visited or called. It was her last party and I learned that you are never too old to celebrate.

When I saw Homebound Visitation as a starter ministry at LOL, I knew I did it for years and should be able to help. I pray diligently for those assigned to me twice a day. It is my honor to do so. Although there are good days and bad relapses, the prayers go on, and God is the ultimate healer. I have to stay out of his way praying for someone to get well when God wants to promote them to eternity in spite of me.

Just this week, Kathy Wilde accompanied me to see a woman in nursing care. Kathy had crocheted a lovely afghan in many colors. The young woman resident wanted to say thank you in person to Kathy. It was heart warming to see the patient so animated and grateful and Kathy pleased with the reaction to her work and love. I take this opportunity to acknowledge her ministry.

I have to be careful that visitation does not become a selfish endeavor for me as the rewards of ministering one on one are so precious. I have many stories to tell, but, instead, encourage any of you who could volunteer to do so. This is a new ministry for the laity at LOL and one that needs to grow with our church population.

Please pray for those who are ill and dying as it is just as important as praying for the unborn. My mother called death "the last great adventure." I am glad she is enjoying her voyage through eternity. Someone should say goodbye and wish the dying both joy and an eternal peace. Too often our seniors are shut away from the world in misery and silence.

Thank you for any work you can do in this area now or in the future as your schedule permits. Thanks for reading this article about exiting life with grace and love.

If you have minor children, the Court decides who will be their guardian(s) and how any estate monies are allocated to the children.

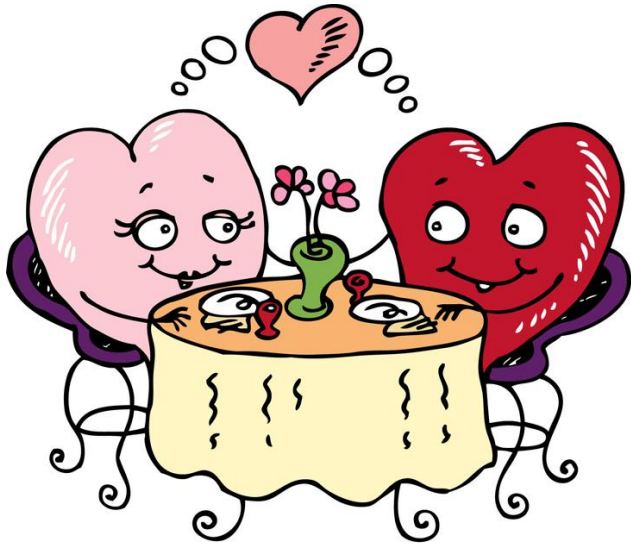

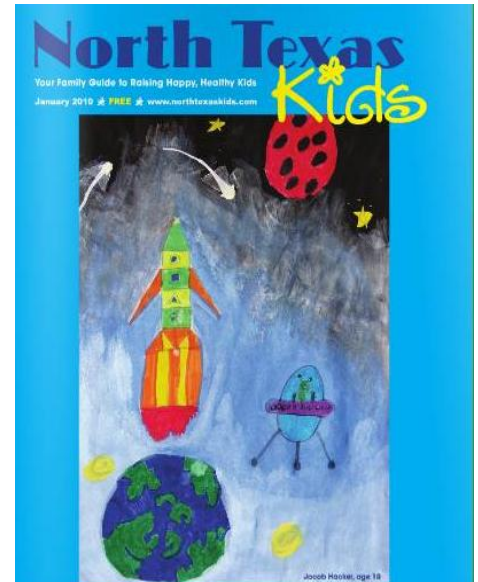

LOL Mission Report - 2009

*"PRAISE BE TO... GOD...
WHO HAS BLESSED US...
WITH EVERY SPIRITUAL BLESSING IN CHRIST!"*

Those blessings are especially apparent in the report of how generously we have been able to support the Lord's work with our offerings at Lord of Life in the year just ended.

But it doesn't stop there. It is equally apparent that we are fully aware of the fact that we have been blessed to be a blessing. As a result, we have been able to support the proclamation of the Gospel far beyond our local congregation.

Statistics can sometimes be boring, but these are significant: Following our commitment to support the mission endeavors of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, 10% of all offerings to the general fund are forwarded to the Texas District. In 2009, that amounted to just over \$ 62,000.

In addition to that, the Board of Elders is responsible for allocating 5% of all offerings to the general fund to support the sharing of God's love through the ministries of social service agencies, mission organizations and congregations. This

enabled us to share an additional \$31,000 to address both the physical and spiritual needs of God's people in various locations here at home and abroad.

But that's not all! Our response to special needs in the form of what are sometimes

called "door offerings," resulted in gifts of just over \$ 14,000. They included things like the angel tree and "Bible sticks" for distribution to military personnel.

That brings the grand total of our mission giving in 2009 to just over \$ 107,000, which is approximately 17% of our gifts to the Lord.

What better way to sum it all up than with the words of St Paul to the Corinthians:

"This service that you perform is not only supplying the need's of God's people but is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God. Because of the service by which you have proved yourselves, men will praise God for the obedience that accompanies your confession of the gospel of Christ, and for your generosity in sharing with them and with everyone else. And in their prayers for you their hearts will go out to you, because of the surpassing grace God has given you. Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift." (2 Corinthians 9:12-15)

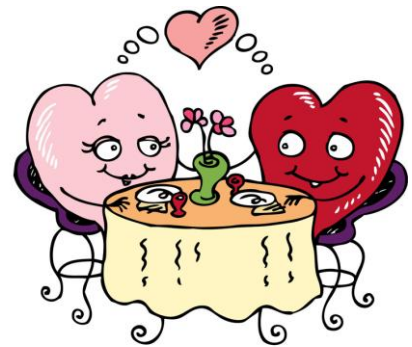
